Dear Mr. Jerman-Blazic,

As you may know, the Internet Society will come into existence at the beginning of 1992 to serve as an umbrella for the global Internet community. In addition to assuming sponsorship for the Internet Activities Board, Engineering Task Force, Research Task Force, and the Interational Networking Conference, the Society will allow rapid sharing of information among those inside and outside the Internet community on its vast range of activities and developments throughout the world.

One of the prime means of sharing such information will occur through its membership publication called

Internet News: The Newsletter of the Internet Society

Internet News serves as the basic publication of the Internet Society for short, timely information. It is a vehicle intended for news-like items that are focussed on more than 150 specific Internet sectors to portray very current developments. Conceptually, the Newsletter aims to create a quarterly global snapshot of Internet and its applications from every relevant perspective.

Every sector will have one (or in some cases several) contributing editors who are really knowledgeable about that sector. Collection and editing of this information will be done through the network to ensure it is efficient and timely shared. Printed versions of the newsletter will be sent in the post a couple of weeks after the editorial closing, and electronic copies will be archived on a server.

Organization and management

YUNAC is the major networking organization on the territory of former Yugoslavia which was set up in 1990 after two years of networking activities. After the political events in Yugoslavia in 1991 YUNAC reorganized itself as an international organization following the example of NORDUNET. Members of YUNAC are Universities, Research Institutes from the Academic and Commercial world from Slovenia, Croatia and Bosna and Herzegovina. The network is managed by Management Committee elected by the members of YUNAC Assembly. YUNAC is organized as limited company. YUNAC was national member of RARE, the European Association of Research Networks and now is changing its status to international membership.

Infrastructure

YUNAC uses as communication infrastructure leased lines (mainly 9.6 Kbits and some 48 Kbps) and PPSDN (Public Packet Switched Data Network). This infrastructure is used for multiprotocol services: DECnet (Phase IV), X.400 and NJE. All YUNAC nodes with X.400 services provide gateway services for e-mail to the DECNET nodes. Some TCP/IP activity is also present. The number of connected hosts is cca 400. The number of local area networks Ethernet and TCP/IP based connected to the YUNAC hosts is growing every day.

YUNAC is connected via leased 64 Kbps line to the International X.25 Infrastructure run by RARE and COSINE. The switch and WEP is located in the YUNAC headquarters.

Services

The services offered to the end users are: electronic mail, computer conferencing, transfer of data, directory services, remote login, and connection to the international networks EARN/BITNET, EUNET/USENET, Internet via gateways.

Regular information service connecting yugoslav users

and distribution lists is also working quite well.
